- 1. How does the Captain give Viola hope?
- 2. What is Viola's plan?
- 3(a) For what does Viola praise the Captain?
  - (b) How is this comment ironic? (connect to her plan)

# Scene iii

- 1. What is Maria's complaint about Sir Toby Belch?
- 2. What merits, according to Sir Toby, has Sir Andrew Aguecheek?
- 3. How does Sir Andrew show himself to be foolish upon entering the scene?
- 4. Sir Toby persuades Sir Andrew not to leave.
  - (a) What reason does he use to convince Sir Andrew to stay?
  - (b) What do you think are his real motives?
- 5. In Shakespeare's plays, a character's name frequently represents his / her essence.
  - (a) What does Sir Toby Belch's name suggest about him?
  - (b) Look up the word "ague" in the dictionary. What does this suggest about Sir Andrew?

### Scene iv

- 1. How does Shakespeare let the audience know that time has passed, and that Viola has succeeded in her plan?
- 2. Explain the <u>dramatic irony</u> of the situation in which Orsino describe's Viola's feminine traits.
- 3. Find the <u>aside</u> in this scene, and state how it advances the plot.
